Starting with Setting

"This is Paris; here the winds of change are blowing, whispering their discontent into the very hearts of her citizens."

Setting can be used to open a story, but not as a stand-alone device, unless it is unusual enough in nature and is later tied into another element, such as the theme. It can be woven into the character, the action or situation, or other story element.

Setting includes: place, time, weather, sensory experiences, culture, etc. For the fantasy and science fiction writers, the word used is world building. But this term doesn't apply to just those genres, for each time a writer sits down to begin a new story, they are creating a new world, not matter if it is like our own or far removed from what we know.

Setting is often coupled with description, but it can be combined with dialog, action, or character thoughts and emotions. It can be used in the opening of a story to help establish a mood.

Some genres might require more detail about setting from the beginning of the story. Historical and science fiction readers usually need more details about setting than many of the other genres. On the other side, consider romance, where the reader is more interested in the characters, so that would be the place to begin.

The horror and thriller stories are others where the writer might begin with setting.

One of the important items for a reader turning to page one is where the story is taking place. This builds a frame for the rest of the story. Try to establish the setting in the first couple of paragraphs.

The devil is in the details. You can gives a specific detail (or two) about a setting without actually naming (telling versus showing) the setting.

For example: Joan put her bags on the floor beside her, her eyes fixed on the plane at the end of the runway.

Showing the character:

That evening T.J. smelled the air, his nostrils dilating with the order of the earth under his feet. "It's spring," he said, and there was a gladness rising in his voice that filled us all with the same feeling.

Special Announcement: New Class Starting January 2011

Due to the intensive nature of this program, all prospective students must first submit an application plus a 500 word sample of their writing. Admittance is at my discretion, and I will be evaluating applications as they are received.

EACH STUDENT WILL...

- Work independently to complete a novel - roughly 593 words per day/2963 words a week (5 days) which gives an 80,000 word manuscript (the student can increase the number of total words, which will give different daily and weekly totals).
- Work in Small Groups five to six per group - giving feedback on assignments for the course work which relate directly to the novel writing; and during the revision phase - giving feedback which each writer will use to revise his/her novel
- Work with a Writing Buddy on assignments and feedback (and support!)

- Finish readings and writing assignments which cover intermediate topics
- Complete a synopsis
- Finalize a query letter
- Complete a submission package
- Learn about the publishing business
- Understand how to submit a novel
