Starting with Emotion

"A screaming comes across the sky." Gravity's Rainbow by Thomas Pynchon

"Mother died today."
The Stranger by Albert Camus

"It was love at first sight." Catch-22 by Joseph Heller

You can begin a story with emotion, either by showing or telling. Yes, we've all been told to show emotions for the most part, and this is one of those times where telling can work. When you start a story with emotion, you are looking to impact the reader in some way.

Try writing your story opening two ways

– using showing and telling and
determine which works best for your
story. Get the opinions of those in your
writing group and from readers. Ask the
following questions:

- Which opening did you like the best?
 Why?
- What didn't you like about the other opening?
- Did you want to read more of the story based on the opening you liked best?
- Was there anything that might improve the opening?

No matter if the story opens with a laugh or a tear, the thing it must do is STIR the reader.

Remember that the opening can set the mood for your scene so if you decide to open with emotion, choose wisely. Also consider that the story ending should tie or relate back to your story opening. A story, often times, closes a loop with the ending. This gives the reader a sense of completeness. Make sure your emotional opening supports and enhances the end of the story.

The opening emotion can be specific or general. For example: "Thomas B. Higgins was born angry." This opening will most likely give the reader a specific set of thoughts, emotions, and might evoke specific memories related to the emotion. On the other side: "The nightmare left Julia uneasy." This emotion is not as specific as the previous example, and might raise various thoughts, emotions, and memoires for the reader.

TRY THIS!

Pick several stories you've already written and rewrite the opening to start with emotion.

Begin a new story with some emotion, based on one of the following:

- A character comes home to find the house has been robbed.
- A character sees a car accident.
- A character thinks they might be having a heart attack.
- A character is fired from his or her job.
